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The total amount raised from the house-to-house collection this year was: £1,572.57. This is an increase on last year's total and only made possible by the dedicated efforts of a few individuals, so on behalf of Christian Aid, a huge thank you to everyone for all your support.

For those of you who are interested in facts and figures, we collected a total of 340 envelopes and Christian Aid will be able to reclaim an additional 25% on £803.05 of the above total (from those who completed the Gift Aid form) adding a further £200 to the total amount. We had 11 collectors plus a further 5 people helping to deliver envelopes, and a wonderful team of 10 people helped count all the money.

Stained Glass: a Metaphor of the Church?

From the Minister

What stained glass can you visualise? Perhaps the modernist stained glass of Coventry Cathedral? Or the traditional stained glass of a Parish Church? A stained glass window has its effect on us because of what we see when the light streams though it. The individual pieces of stained glass are irregular, they may contain tiny flaws, and are different colours; but when each piece is placed in the design of the stained glass designer, and when the light streams through it, the picture or design manifests itself to the viewer. What the stained glass is doing is filtering the light. It is totally dependent upon the

quality of light that shines through it. Indeed, when there is no light, the stained glass is dark and unremarkable. But when light shines either from the outside in, or from the inside out, a spectacle of colour and pattern is manifested.

You and I are each a different piece of stained glass. Individually we are irregular, we contain tiny flaws, we are all different colours; yet when put together in that design called 'church', and when we face the eternal light that streams from God, we constitute something so colourful and attractive that it makes people take notice. Yet we are only a patterned-filter through which others see the light of God. God the Father is the source of light; Jesus, his Son, is the light-beam; and the Holy Spirit is the effect of that light-beam that illuminates and warms. As stained glass draws attention to the varieties of colours in the light spectrum; so we as the church are to draw attention to the manifold attributes of God's character.

The word 'glory' that features so prominently in both the Old and New Testaments, is the manifestation of God's true character and nature.

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The Church believes that Jesus is the human person in whom we have seen God's glory; "...such glory as befits the Father's onlybegotten Son, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14) Jesus says to his disciples, "Let your light so shine before others, that when they see the good you do they may glorify your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:16) In letting God's light shine through what we do, others may be drawn towards God's glorious character of truth and love; of justice and grace.

Our task is to point people to that vision of God manifested in the

Scriptures and in the person of Jesus Christ: a vision of truth and love; of justice and grace. The good we do, both individually and collectively, should constitute our mission of putting into practice truth and love; justice and grace. What might this mean in practice?

1. Truth. Let us be truthful and self-critical and realistic about who we are and what we can do with God's help. Being flawed isthank God-no barrier to our heavenly Father shining his light through us.

2. Love. Let love for God and love for one another motivate all that we do. For some, this will mean first accepting that they are loveable and loved by God; just as the stained-glass artisan loves and uses all shapes and colours of glass.

3. Justice. Let justice characterise all our dealings with one another, which means treating one another fairly and being willing to speak up for those denied justice.

4. Grace. Grace is God's active help, without which we can do nothing for God. When we accept God's gracious help, it gives us the strength and motivation to be gracious and helpful to others.



The Great Ejection 1662, Dissent and Nonconformity

The Reverend Michael Hopkins (United Reformed Church Minister whom I tutored as an ordinand at Mansfield College, Oxford) gave us an informative talk on one of the most significant events that shaped the Protestant church in England—the Great Ejection of 1662-because it effectively divided Protestants into different groups that would later become separate denominations. By Saint Bartholomew's Day, 24th August, 1662, over 2000 mostly Presbyterian Ministers refused to conform to the Act of Uniformity, which required the exclusive use of the Book of Common Prayer for worship and ministerial re-ordination by a bishop. Those who conformed remained in the Church of England. Those who did not conform were ejected from their livings as Ministers. They and their congregations were known initially as Dissenters, and later as Nonconformists-a title still occasionally used today.

The Conventicle Act made it illegal for more than 5 people to worship unless they used Book of Common Prayer. Michael told us about a dissenting Meeting House that was built right on the boundary of Dorset and Devon, with doors on both sides. This enabled worshippers, if investigated by officials of one county, to flee to the other and escape their jurisdiction!

The Five Mile Act of 1665 required that a dissenting meeting could not

gather within 5 miles of the centre of a town or city. This, for example, led to the establishment of a dissenting meeting in Highgate, which is five miles from Charing Cross. In 1672 a limited indulgence was granted by Parliament. Upon application, dissenters could be granted a licence to meet in a private house. In 1689, limited toleration was granted for dissenters to build Meeting Houses, in exchange for an oath of allegiance to the Crown. But dissenters were still barred from the universities and the professions. Some Presbyterians set up their own Dissenting Academies. Many of these became Unitarian, others became Congregational.

Michael had done some research about Barnet's dissenting history. John Corbet, Rector of Bramshot, Hampshire, was ejected in 1662, and was later found preaching at Chipping Barnet in 1669. John Faldo was not ejected, but was also preaching at Chipping Barnet in 1669, and licensed as a Presbyterian Minister in 1672. William Tutty, the incumbent of Totteridge, was ejected in 1661, and in 1669 was known to be preaching at Chipping Barnet. Samuel Shaw, Rector of East Barnet, was ejected in 1660. The establishment of a dissenting meeting in 1669, the descendent of which is Wood Street United Reformed Church, was largely

due to these dissenters. English Presbyterians mostly became Unitarians in the 1700 -1800's. Unitarianism is essentially a rationalist belief in God that denies the Holy Trinity and Christ's divinity. Those Presbyterians who subscribed to orthodox belief often became Congregationalists. Congregationalism, and Presbyterianism in Scotland, was deeply affected by the Evangelical Revival spearheaded by the Wesleys and Whitefield, who also created Methodism. Scots Presbyterians who moved south of the border later revived English Presbyterianism. It was English Presbyterians who united with English and Welsh Congregationalists in 1972 to form the United **Reformed Church** (Congregationalists and Presbyterians in New Barnet had already united to form St John's Church in 1963).


Toc H London Walk Saturday 1st September 2012


He has debated with leading atheists including Professor Richard Dawkins and he reveals the fallacies and blind faith that support their
