In doing my homework I discovered that the German Lutheran Theologian Rudolph Otto (1869 - 1937) uses the word 'numinous' to mean being in the presence of an awesome power in his 1936 book "The Idea of the Holy". He describes it as, an experience found in liturgies and religious buildings. Otto's book greatly influenced C. S. Lewis, I also discovered.

So when did you last have an experience which was amazing, astonishing, exciting, fascinating, uncanny, surprising, forceful, miraculous, awesome, powerful, or even mysterious? Could it have been a numinous experience?

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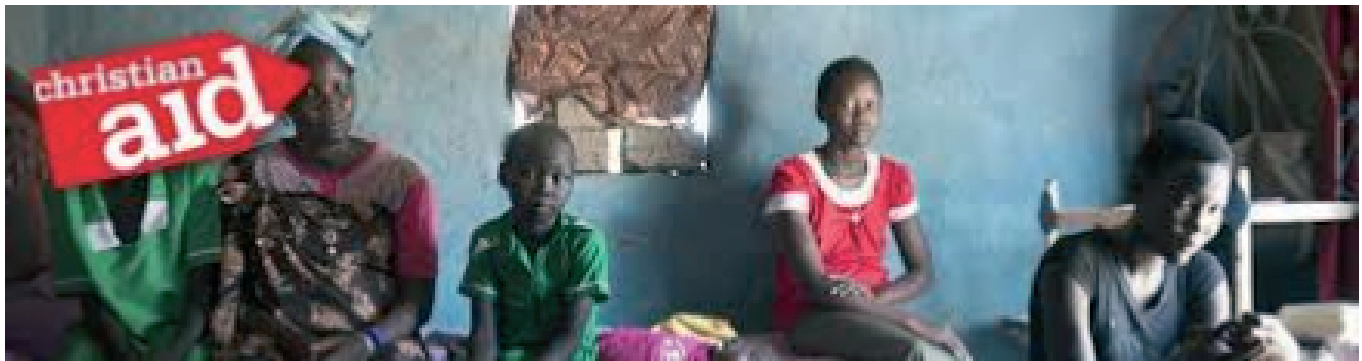
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REPORT ON CHRISTIAN AID WEEK, 11-17 May 2014

Thank You!

The total amount raised from the house-to-house collection this year was: **£1,816.53**. This is an increase on last year's total and only made possible by the dedicated efforts of a few individuals, so on behalf of Christian Aid, a huge thank you to everyone for all your support.

For those of you who are interested in facts and figures, we collected a total of 294 envelopes and Christian Aid will be able to reclaim an additional 25% on £852.49 of the above total (from those who completed the Gift Aid form) adding a further £213 to the total amount. We had 10 collectors plus a further 4 people helping to deliver envelopes, and a wonderful team of 8 people helped count all the money.

Thank you so much for everything you did during Christian Aid Week.

We are again truly humbled by your efforts: your organising, collecting, abseiling, prayers, cake sales, worship, supermarket collections, flute recitals, concerts, ventriloquism and so much more. But most importantly, thanks to you, many more people in Colombia, Iraq, South Sudan and elsewhere will be able to lead a life free from fear. Now, with support from Christian Aid, Sara is growing up in a thriving and vibrant community. Where once lay only rubble, now there are greenhouses

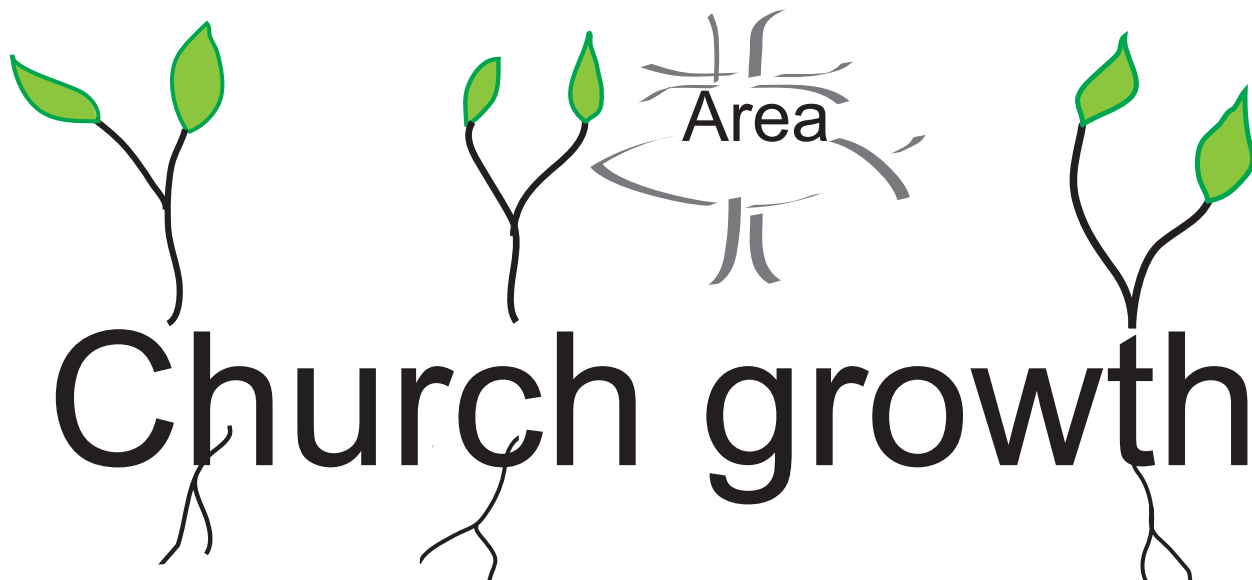
bursting with vegetables, a reservoir teeming with fish, a house that Sara's family feels safe in; and soon there will be electricity in the power lines.

Church Growth - Area Forum Event Tuesday 20 May at Christ Church, New Southgate and Friern Barnet by Roz Douglas

Led by the Rev'd Kate Hackett from Tetherdown URC Church, Muswell Hill, this was an interesting evening of prayer, presentation and discussion about the essential ingredients for church growth. This is a really important issue for most URC churches and one which our church has been considering for the past year.

Worship was led by Rev'd Caroline Rogers who hosted the event in the church hall at her church - Christ Church New Southgate and Friern Barnet.

Kate Hackett stepped into the breach at the last minute as Tim Reith, Synod Mission Enabler, was unable to attend due to family reasons, and she did an excellent job, clearly setting out the 7 marks of a healthy church. These are:

1/ Energised by faith, a healthy church is fit for purpose and self aware.

2/ Outward looking focus - is your church working in partnership with other denominations and organisations to help local communities? This includes food banks and local charities. It also includes having an effective website and organising and publicising events.

3/ Seeking to find out what God wants your church to do. "How many of us" Kate asked" sit down in prayer groups in church meetings and

make space to listen to what God wants of us? Do we allow God room to speak to us?"

4/ A healthy church faces the costs of change and growth, and does not resist change e.g. organising Messy Church and different types of church services. "If we are to be led by the Spirit, surely we should be changing all the time? We should ask ourselves. Why do we just go on doing some things?"

5/ Operating as a community. A church is not a club for a bit of worship and coffee. It should be a family and we should recognise the gifts of leadership we have. Ordained Elders should have freedom to lead. "But we should recognise that some people are afraid to enter and be sucked into too many duties. Relationships are the core part of the church. When new people come in, ask them what they think of your church."

6/A healthy church is inclusive and makes room for all. As a Christian community, we should be like Jesus. He never excludes anyone and we have to offer the hand of hospitality, not be an exclusive club.

7/ All churches must do the basics well. A healthy church does a few things really well. "Ask yourselves - What are your church's strengths?" Recommended - 'The Healthy Church Handbook' by Robert Warren.

Concert. This was followed by Smetana's tone poem Vltava, a beautiful flowing piece describing the river in the Czech Republic and through Prague. A number of those present were reminded of the Church holiday some years ago in Prague.

After an extract from Haydn's Variations on the St Anthony Chorale, we changed direction completely, and were taken back to the very well known pop group of the sixties, The Seekers, singing "Rocking, Rolling, Riding" and "Georgie's Girl." Both Philip and I, and I suspect other men present, admitted to having a bit of a

crush at the time on their lead vocalist, Judith Durham!!

Sylvia told us that when she was teaching at a School in St. Albans, the Head asked her to arrange "Georgie's Girl" as a



combined song and dance act for her class, and this was so successful that the girls kept asking, "When can we do it again?"

We had a change from music, for an interval, with the recording of Gerard Hoffnung at the Oxford Union, recounting the story of the spare bricks at the top of a building and the barrel at the bottom! I have no intention of trying to explain this, except to say that it was hilarious. The event is available on Google for those who have no idea what I am talking about. The London Welsh Male Voice Choir gave a wonderful

rendering of the Hymn, "When I survey the wondrous cross," which was followed by three Hymns chosen by Sylvia and Philip for their funerals, these were:- "O love that will not let me go", "The day thou gavest Lord has ended", and "Thine be the glory." Both Adrian and Peter played the trumpet in their respective School Orchestra and Wind Band, etc. and Sylvia and Philip's love of brass band music was obvious from the John Philip Sousa march, "Washington Post" and

the Grand March from Verdi's Opera, Aida.

To round the evening off, Philip chose Dudley Moore in the revue, Beyond the Fringe, playing his own arrangement of some popular tunes of the day, but as a full blown Classical setting for the pianoforte!

We all thoroughly enjoyed the very varied and entertaining programme and our thanks were expressed in the usual way at the end.

On a warm summer afternoon on the 14th June, fifteen members of St John's Fellowship met at Jordans Mill, in Broom, near Biggleswade. The 150 year old mill is on the river Ivel, where the river has powered the milling process, first through a traditional water wheel, and since the 1890's a horizontal turbine wheel.

Our members had an opportunity to wander

round their beautiful gardens, where we saw examples of the cereal crops, vegetables and flowers grown in the area. There was a nature trail running next to the river and through some woods.

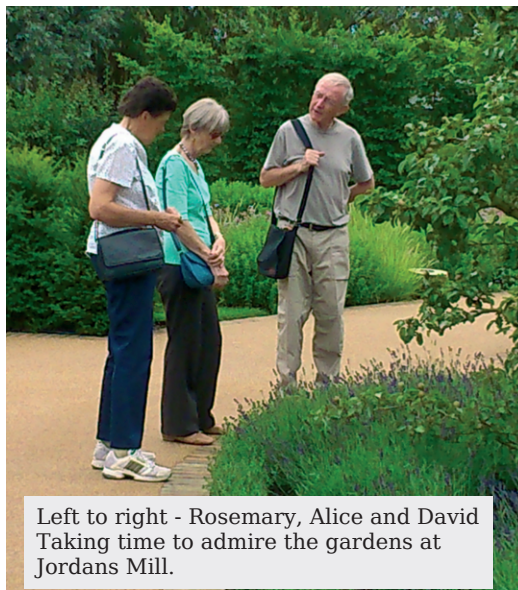
After exploring all that, many had worked up a thirst, so they headed off to the cafe overlooking the river to enjoy a cup of tea and the slice of cake.

Then at three o'clock we all assembled for our private guided tour of the mill. Our guide kept us interested and amused with tales of the Jordan family. We heard how "William 3rd" was the nasty William, how "William 4th" was nice, but got into many scrapes flying. We even met briefly "William 7th" - the present owner.

The mill is no longer used to grind flour, but we saw all the machinery being powered by a labyrinth of wheels, belts, pulleys, cogs and levers,

stretching up four floors from the river below. Heath Robinson would have been proud! We had the whole process of milling, along with its history explained; everyone was enthralled that something we take for granted should have such a history.
