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Every year, the Season of Creation ecumenical steering committee comes up with a theme to help churches around the world strengthen our united response during this shared season of reflection and action. MASS LOBBY OF PARLIAMENT

n 9th July 2025, over 5,000 people came together at Westminster to call on MPs to act now for a healthier, fairer, safer future. It was one of the biggest moments for climate and nature this year, and the largest mass lobby of the decade.

Representatives of the URC and Thames North Synod took part in the Faith Photocall at The Climate Coalition Mass Lobby. Some of them were able to meet with their MP and were invited to ask them to back bold, practical action by committing to:



- 1. Deliver vital funding to communities hit hardest by climate change here and around the world.
- 2. Cut bills, back UK jobs, and secure a greener fairer future for all.
- 3. Restore nature to create a safer, healthier future.

Those who met Dan Tomlinson, Labour MP for Chipping Barnet, were encouraged by his concern for the environment. On a national level the importance of a strong plan backed by the Climate Change Committee, to commit to reduction of emissions,

the reduction/mitigation of global south debt and tackling energy poverty with a national insulation programme were highlighted and a levy on the greatest polluters such as frequent flyers. On a local level it was mentioned that he is working alongside Barnet Council to encourage schemes such as the provision of solar panels which are already planned for Barnet Hospital and Ark Pioneer. There are also plans to work with local schools supporting a pilot scheme to improve air quality with the involvement of students and staff.

As well as an opportunity to meet our local MP there were a number of organisations represented at the Queen Elizabeth II Centre in Westminster including Friends of the Earth, Tearfund, Green Christian, WWF Fund for Nature, and RSPB. Talks had also been organised during the day about a number of issues such as the effects of climate change worldwide.



The Faith Space held a panel discussion between Canon Giles Goddard from Faith for the Climate, Amandeep Maur Khan from EcoSikhUK and Jonathan Wittenberg EcoJudaism considering biodiversity and other climate related issues worldwide.





































Ultimately it was hoped that the unmissable message would be heard by MP's that **communities** across the UK are ready for bold, practical action on climate and nature.

There will be further opportunities for taking action from 13th-20th September 2025, when there will be a nationwide Lobby Week organized by the Climate Coalition as part of the annual Season of Creation which takes place this year from 1st September to 4th October 2025 when Christians come together for prayer and action.

The Joint Creation Service taking place at St John's URC on 21st September 2025 will highlight the importance of our responsibilities to care for our planet, as we all strive to reach Net-Zero by 2030.

Fellowship:

BARNET DURING THE CIVIL WAR 1642-1660

S t John's Fellowship welcomed local historian, Yasmine Webb, to their July meeting who gave a talk on 'How life was impacted for people in Barnet during the Civil War 1642-1660'. Yasmine has kindly sent through a short summary of her talk.



"There was a conflict of religious ideas, where Parliament feared papal influence had embarked on ousting ministers and accruing information regarding church assets and property. The parishes of Barnet, Hadley, and South Mimms all had ministers sequestered in the 1640s. A time of dissent between King and Parliament led to Civil War. The war increased the movement of Parliamentarian troops through Barnet who were garrisoned on the Common, impacting on demands for local provisions but increasing trade at the inns. The town strategically positioned was clustered by a number of inns accommodating travellers to and from London. General Monke stayed at The Mitre Inn in the High Street when bringing troops to London to re-instate Charles II to the throne in 1660, highlighting the importance of the town in this chapter of history".

A good number of the Fellowship attended this meeting and following her talk Yasmine answered some further questions on this important period in Barnet's history. Yasmine later wrote back saying how much she had enjoyed the evening.

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'Not a lot of people know that...'

ou may not know that the Bechstein piano in the church — loaned by the Mills family —is over one hundred years old. But you are even less likely to know that it had been played by


an internationally renowned classical pianist. That pianist was Alfred Brendel who died in June this year at the age of ninety four. Unlike

many successful musicians, none of his family were musical and he had no particular talent for the art when he was a child. He had a

long performing career – giving his first recital in Graz, Austria, when he was 17 and his last concert sixty years later, in Vienna in December 2008. He was the first pianist to record all of Beethoven's piano compositions.

So how did he come to be playing the Bechstein piano which now sits in the church? Alfred Brendel performed concerts on behalf of the Toc H Music Club in the late 1970s and early 1980s. Cyril Mills, father of Andrew Mills, was a member of Mill Hill Toc H and was on the committee of the Music Club. On one occasion Brendel was giving an evening recital at a venue in Borehamwood; he was not able to practise at the venue in the afternoon and Cyril offered the use of the Mills family Bechstein piano at their house in Deacons Hill Road which Alfred Brendel gladly accepted.
