s we approach the year's end and the season of Advent and Christmas we turn our thoughts to the birth of Christ and his mother Mary. When the angel Gabriel came to her and said, "Greetings, favoured one! The Lord is with you." Luke records that she was 'much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favour with God". As a young Jewish woman this form of address would have brought to mind the way in which the great prophets in the Hebrew Bible were addressed by God when he was calling them to an important task. Think of Moses at the burning bush or Joshua leading his people to the Promised Land. So when Mary hears from Gabriel "The Lord is with you," she is standing in the tradition of the patriarchs and prophets of the Old Testament.

Mary, in spite of her fears and troubled emotions, was prepared to hear the Lord's call; she replies, "Here I am, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."

There have been many women who have heard and responded to the Lord's call throughout history: Joan of Arc, Corrie Ten Boom, Gladys Aylward, Mother Teresa of Calcutta to name a few.

One woman, whose name you may not know, is Guli Francis-Dehqani. She grew up in Iran. Her father was a Muslim-born convert to Christianity who later became the Anglican Bishop in Iran. Her mother was born in Iran to second-generation British missionaries. Following the Islamic revolution of 1979, persecution of Christians in the country increased rapidly and her parents narrowly survived an attempted assassination. Just months later, her brother was murdered, aged just twenty-four. He was killed, Guli says, as "a scapegoat" for her father.

Just as Mary and Joseph became refugees in Egypt after the birth of Jesus, when Joseph was warned in a dream to flee because King Herod wanted to kill the infant, so Guli's family fled to the United Kingdom when she was a teenager. Following in her father's footsteps, she became Bishop of Chelmsford in 2021 — the first



minority ethnic woman to be ordained as a bishop in the UK — and she was one of the leading candidates for Archbishop of Canterbury this year.

Her book, Listening to the Music of the Soul is the Archbishop of York's Advent book for this year. We will be looking at parts of it over a three week course. (See the notice below.)

Bishop Guli says: "My parents were extraordinary people. They had a very deep, authentic faith. I still recall a sermon my father preached in the early stages of the revolution. He said: "We preach forgiveness, we preach reconciliation, we preach being people of goodwill – and that is going to be tested. Our faith is nothing if we don't live it out when we enter times of trial and temptation."


'Listening to the music of the soul' 'Violence, Angels and Reconciliation'

This Advent we will have the opportunity to explore three chapters of Guli Francis-Dehqani's book, 'Listening to the music of the soul'.

Born in Iran, Guli's family left the country in the wake of the Iranian Revolution in 1980, when she was 13 years old Guli Francis-Dehqani is the Bishop of Chelmsford, she makes connections between the themes of Advent and her own experiences – and invites us to do the same. The three chapters we will delve into are entitled, Violence, Angels and Reconciliation. Each chapter is linked to a piece of music.

Many relate to the theme for the year, reflecting on times when God comes close to us and when we, in prayer and in daily life, may come close to God. They have been composed thoughtfully, edited carefully and presented beautifully in the hope that they will find a ready home, whether from a lectern or at a bedside. May they provide words with which to pray, so that God's loving touch may be known.

As editors, we are so grateful to those who took the risk of submitting prayers and whose words often moved us deeply. We have been mutual editors of each other's work too and grateful for the process of what we hope is a refiner's fire! Thanks are also due to those at Church House who turn the text into a work of beauty. Above all, may praise be given to God who touches us through words, silence, and sacrament.

CHRISTIAN CONFERENCE'Refreshing Your Ministry'

n early October I attended a Conference for URC Ministers and Lay Preachers at The Hayes Christian Conference Centre at Swanwick in Derbyshire. The conference was entitled 'Refreshing Your Ministry' organised by the Group for Evangelism and Renewal within the URC. (GEAR). The Centre had been much extended since the St John's Youth Group stayed there for the URC Holiday Forum in 1979 with Grace Orr and Revd Philip Eastman, and can now accommodate 400 people with 247 bedrooms.

There were thirty of us from a number of URC Synods around the country, including four from Thames North Synod. It was good to be able to have a time of networking together in the lounge when the bar was open in the evening.

As well as inspiring worship there were excellent speakers with subjects ranging from 'Finding Jesus', 'Healing Ministry', 'Effective Evangelism', 'Deepening our Prayer Life' and 'Being guided by the Holy Spirit'. The Bible Study on 'Discipleship' led by Revd Alex Jacob, based on the calling of the first Disciples in the Gospel of St John, helped me to think about my own faith journey and the importance of being active in my Christian journey rooted in the Bible. I would recommend the book by Alex Jacob entitled 'Discipleship' (2024) reminding us that the parables Jesus taught are 'Kingdom Parables' (Matthew Ch.13 v.44). The healing ministry of Jesus demonstrates God's kingdom power and promises. The prayer life and teaching of Jesus is kingdom-focused and his final commission to his disciples is to go and make known the kingdom by making, baptising, and teaching new disciples. He makes the point that Kingdom and discipleship are intrinsically linked. Kingdom is the message; discipleship is the method.

Each one of us can be 'Good News People' as we share the Gospel message of God's love for us through the life, death, and resurrection of His Son Jesus Christ.

It was a most stimulating few days sharing together with other Christians with lively worship and encouraging teaching in a pleasant environment with good accommodation and excellent food.

NEWS FROM SVITAVY

embers and friends may remember that our twin church in Svitavy, in Czechia, and Filip and Květa especially, have been working to create a housing complex for elderly people in Vendoli, in their local area. When completed it will be home to twenty elderly people with support and some shared facilities. Květa says that "... hopefully the home will be a pleasant and dignified place for them for the last stage of their lives." When our friends from Svitavy visited in 2024 they showed us photos of the early stages of the project; the good news is that it is now nearing completion.



We have received the following update from Květa:



Dear friends, we are in touch with you again after a few months. During that time, the construction has made significant progress and we are approaching the final stage. The building has completely changed since the "rough" construction a year ago. Although not everything is finished, equipment and interior elements such as cabinets, tables, chairs, beds, kitchen equipment, and other furniture are still missing, but even now you can feel very comfortable inside. Large windows, wooden ceilings, parquet floors in the shared areas and a large tree in the entrance hall give the house a family atmosphere. We believe that the residents will soon settle into the new premises and feel at home. We plan to refurbish the home during the autumn and at the same time we have already launched the registration process and are looking for the employees. I believe that we will be able to create a team of people who will like to work with seniors, for whom this work will bring joy and a sense of meaning. We plan to open the home in February 2026. Thank you for supporting us from afar, both in prayers and thoughts. It means a lot to us. We look forward to planning your visit here soon so you can see the home in person.



Květa has studied to achieve qualifications in the care of elderly people and at the end of August she left her job at the Supreme Court in Brno and is now employed by Diakonia, an international organisation supporting projects that "ensure a dignified future for vulnerable people." She is already working alongside a nurse and a social worker as they prepare to welcome the first residents, and Filip has also been busy with technical issues. We are so pleased to hear that the project is so near completion, and send our friends in Svitavy our best wishes for the final few months of planning.
